FEATURED SCHOLARS



Linda S. Ferber, Art Historian & Director Emerita New-York Historical Society

Dr. Linda S. Ferber was previously the Andrew Mellon curator of American Art at the Brooklyn Museum, now emerita, where she was also chief curator during a tenure of several decades. She has organized

exhibitions, published, taught, and lectured on topics including William T. Richards, the American Pre-Raphaelites, the American Watercolor Movement, the Eight and the Ashcan School, Albert Bierstadt, Asher B. Durand, and the Hudson River School. Now an independent curator, she is co-volume editor of the forthcoming book: *Tastemakers, Collectors, and Patrons: Collecting American Art in the Long Nineteenth Century*.



Nancy Siegel, Professor of Art History Towson University

Dr. Nancy Siegel specializes in American landscape studies, print culture, underrepresented women artists, and culinary history of the 18th and 19th centuries. In 2010, she co-curated, with Jennifer Krieger, the

exhibition, *Remember the Ladies: Women of the Hudson River School* at the Cole Site—the first show devoted exclusively to these artists. This year she will co-curate, *Women Reframe American Landscape: Susie Barstow & Her Circle/Contemporary Practices*. Her new book, *Susie M. Barstow: Redefining the Hudson River School*, publishes this spring.



Sophie Lynford, Annette Woolard-Provine Curator, Bancroft Collection, Delaware Art Museum

Dr. Sophie Lynford specializes in 19th-century American and British art. She was previously the Rousseau Curatorial Fellow at the Harvard Art Museums and the Douglass Foundation Fellow at the Metropolitan

Museum of Art. She has worked in the curatorial departments of the New-York Historical Society and the Yale Center for British Art. In 2018, she co-curated the exhibition *Picturesque and Sublime: Thomas Cole's Trans-Atlantic Inheritance* at the Thomas Cole Historic Site. Her book, *Painting Dissent: Art, Ethics, and the American PreRaphaelites*, was published by Princeton University Press in fall 2022. The Thomas Cole National Historic Site preserves and interprets the original home and studios of the artist and early environmentalist Thomas Cole (1801-1848). Cole founded the influential 19th-century art movement now known as the Hudson River School of landscape painting.

Located in the Hudson Valley, the historic site includes Thomas Cole's 1815 home, his 1839 studio, his reconstructed 1846 New Studio that he designed, and gardens and grounds with views of the Catskill Mountains. The site is an affiliate of the National Park Service and operates as a forward-thinking, independent nonprofit organization, responsible for raising the entire operating budget each year. Our vision is to be the leading source for education and scholarship stemming from Thomas Cole and to inspire cultural and environmental awareness of American land.



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
